As Denver Broncos fans, you already know that the 2015 season ended with the Broncos hoisting the Vince Lombardi trophy, but join me for a brief look back over the season at how the Broncos won their third Super Bowl.

Two years after having a record setting offence but ultimately falling short in Super Bowl 48, John Elway had stuck to his belief that he needed to change things up especially on the defence, Wade Phillips returned as defensive coordinator and Gary Kubiak replaced John Fox as head coach. Kubiak's zone blocking run game offence which used a mobile QB as a threat was not something that was likely to mesh with Peyton Manning. Indeed from the outside looking in, it appeared as if there was not a happy mix between Manning and the system he had run throughout his pro career and Kubiak, yet the Broncos started 6-0 going into the bye week

thanks largely to a reborn defence that was proving its worth each and every week, getting QB pressures, sacks and takeaways as well as putting points on the board themselves. Defence may win Championships, but when it's a defence as good as this, it can damn well win games every bit as much as offence.



After the bye, the Packers were in town and Manning and Kubiak seemed to have come to an understanding, instead of his usual shotgun position Manning moved forward into the pistol with a tailback behind him and on that night everything would work for Denver, racking up a 29-10 victory in what would prove the most impressive all-round performance of the regular season. Two defeats would follow though to Indianapolis and Kansas City, the Chiefs game saw Manning set the NFL passing yardage record but ironically it was perhaps his worst ever game and he was replaced by Brock Osweiler. It would later emerge that Manning had an injured foot.

Installing Osweiler led to Kubiak putting in more of his running style offence and CJ Anderson began to make the RB position his own, in victories over Chicago, New England and San Diego, but defeats to Oakland and Pittsburgh left Denver in a position where they might not even make the playoffs. As was once famously said, "on to Cincinnati", but not to Andy Dalton who was injured, this would be Osweiler v AJ McCarron.

Cometh the Hour, Cometh the Man, or in this case, Cometh the Defensive unit. With the season on the line the defence stepped it up and Brandon McManus kicked the winning FG to put things back on track. Week 17 vs the heavily depleted Chargers should have been a formality but it wasn't and with the Chargers leading in the second half Anderson fumbled, Kubiak turned back to Manning and the whole season shifted, right there, right then.

Manning hardly threw the ball when he came in, but he called the protections and called the correct running plays as Denver came back to win. The defence, sensing a shift in momentum, also ramped it up as Malik Jackson and Derek Wolfe got pressure up the middle to complement DeMarcus Ware and Von Miller on the edge,



the team never looked back and clinched the number one seed. Coming into Divisional round Kubiak announced Manning was again the starter and Denver had the chance to avenge a regular season loss to Pittsburgh, but this time Pittsburgh was missing Bell and Brown. Two early scores and the defence did the



rest, to hold on 23-16 to set up the final ever Manning-Brady bowl, when Manning and Bradv meet аt the Championship game the odds tend to go with number 18, but this was more about number 58 as Miller in particular got to and disrupted Brady time and time again. As is often the case though with the Pats, it came to the last play but as was also often the case this

year, the Broncos defence held on and a date with the Panthers and league MVP Cam Newton was arranged in Super Bowl 50.

Newton was the number one pick in the draft the year Miller was selected number two, that draft also had JJ Watt, a now 3 time defensive player of the year, but he would swap all of those awards to do what Von Miller did that night. The league's best offence was not a match for his speed and power and Miller was dominant, directly responsible for setting up both Denver touchdowns as well as covering slot receivers when required. DeMarcus Ware was almost equally dominant off the other edge and Denver were World Champions once more.


and his attitude is infectious. He is already a leader and it's showing.





Denver Broncos - The Complete Illustrated History By Jim Saccomano

This offseason was never going to go well but few saw the apparent self destruction of the roster and the egotistical low balling of the GM to the teams best player. This is the sort of thing you read on Twitter everyday and has some Bronco fans jumping ship.

Firstly only 3 key starters have left the team (Manning has retired, Jackson went to the Jags as a free agent along with Trevathan who has joined former coach John Fox in Chicago). That's 9 of the starting 11 from the leagues best defence returning to compete for Super Bowl 51. Now on the other hand, the dumpsterfire offence has had a good shuffle. Under performing players like Evan Mathis and Louis Vasquez have been released, Ryan Clady has been traded to the New York Jets, Ryan Harris has left for the Steelers and Tyler Polumbus retired.

The big news this off season is that Brock Osweiler decided to leave Denver for Houston. I really expected Brock to take the reigns from Peyton and take the Broncos forward with the help from a QB friendly offence run by coach Kubiak, but he chose 82 million Texan dollars instead.

I have one issue with this off season so far. The lack of urgency to lock our key players up. John Elway, the God of the Bronco world and rightly so, needs to lock key players up a year earlier than he is. Elway has been burned by the Thomas deal which could of been cheaper the year before and imagine the contract



Von Miller would of got last year. Sanchez will lead us to the playoffs. There I said it. The Broncos will average 24 points.

Granted, he might not of performed like he did last year but still we wouldn't have this headache hanging over us until the 15th July. With Sanders needing to get paid and with Marshall and the other restricted free agents needing to be paid, it all leaves less and less wiggle room for the Miller deal, which by the way will get sorted before 15th July. The longer we leave it the more players get big guaranteed money and just adds to the idea Von Miller deserves this much or that much. With Fletcher Cox getting \$63 million guaranteed and now Andrew Luck getting \$87 million guaranteed, and I think Von Miller is worth more to the Broncos than they do to their teams, I wonder how much he will cost us. Sanchez will lead us to the playoffs. There, I said it.

The Broncos will average 24 points a game this year despite the tough schedule. I think we will go 8-0 at home and 4-4 on the road. That,s my take just from the off season. We had a brilliant draft, again taking talent over positional needs and despite the lack of faith in the media I really think this team will go all the way. Acquiring Sanchez is an upgrade on the Peyton of last year, being able to play offensive line players in their correct positions and the signing to a team friendly contract by Okung steadies our run and pass game.
